

## UN DECLARATION ON THE RIGHTS OF INDIGENOUS PEOPLE (UNDRIP)

Amos 5: 24

The *UN Declaration*, first adopted by the UN General Assembly in 2007, marked a significant milestone in international human rights law. It affirms the rights of Indigenous peoples worldwide and fosters relations grounded in justice, democracy, respect, and good faith.

In June 2021, the Canadian government enacted the *UNDRIP Act*. By June 2023, a federal action plan with 181 measures was introduced to reinforce and advance Indigenous peoples' rights, combat systemic racism, and promote self-governance.

British Columbia has its own framework for the *UN Declaration* and unveiled an action plan in 2022. Similarly, in 2023, the Northwest Territories presented Bill 85, which outlines a strategy for the *Declaration*'s implementation.

The *UNDRIP Act* signifies progress towards reconciliation but isn't the final destination. This plan charts a course for the collaboration between the Canadian government and First Nations, Inuit, and Métis, aiming for national healing and unity.
